1) **Welcome Everyone**, guests from CAA of Northeast Alabama, summer VISTAs, Advocacy Interns, Caucus Members and Fahe Staff.

2) AL Caucus Business

- a. **Approve Minutes of February meeting** Aron moved for approval, Mary Ellen seconded; approved unanimously
- b. **Nominating Committee** (Mary Ellen Judah) since we elected the Caucus Chair and Mary Ellen offered to serve on the Nominating Committee, we won't have another go-around until June 2022. Make recommendations for easing the lift caucus chair what would make it easier to serve want to make sure that there are numerous opportunities not only at the board and at the Caucus meetings. Mary Ellen is always looking for opportunities and serves on the Membership Committee and the Finance Committee. You get to see the breadth and depth of the work across the region.

3) American Rescue Plan

Aron – guidance coming in the Fall per Ellen Wallace at AHFA

<u>Mary Ellen</u> – seeing a little of the Rental Asst. \$ trickling in – difficulties getting residents to fill out the paperwork

<u>Tim</u> – HeadStart \$\$ coming in, also Relief coming to residents via LIHEAP and Weatherization <u>Mary Ellen</u>: Residents may be back at work but lots are seeing reduction in hours; small businesses are having trouble filing positions – likely waiting for unemployment benefits to run out.

<u>Alex</u>: State level agencies – sounds like same issues – not the best of working relationships. This could be a strengthening force for your organizations while doing good work for your communities.

Push the local jurisdiction money – flexible – and it can be disbursed to non-profit partners. <u>Tim</u>: CDBG \$ for infrastructure, some jurisdictions have HOME funds for allocations that may not have the same

Talked to AHFA on the overriding material costs – Aron wrote a member – AAHA is sending a letter to AHFA to let them know that as a group, we can't continue to address increased costs (Jeff Little, Underwriter at AHFA, specifically to amend the QAP) while surrounding states are looking at forward commitment of credits.

Aron: AHFA is not as open as other states to working with the property developments. Barbara Wallace and Jeff – Aaron is touching base each week. I do know that a lot of lenders and syndicators are writing letters to AHFA to let them know how serious this is. Robert Strickland – David Young's boss. This is a real issue and projects are in real jeopardy. Mary Ellen: Properties that started construction before COVID or last year – increased material costs and delays on supplies as well as labor shortages. Construction loan interest issue – negative impact on credit delivery with investors – share the stories with AHFA – this will be a problem for some time. AHFA received \$41M of HOME – they have a pretty tight box with HOME funds – must be a 56 unit development – release the restrictions. Keep educating locally and at the state. The money needs to be used. For example – Mary Ellen met with city planner/engineering dept. and noted that the road cost couldn't be included in basis – they didn't know that.

Tim: Financial Stability funds via the ARP – grant funds for NWA, HUD Counseling agency – does that fit or can you partner with anyone to do that? Opportunity as agencies in AL to make a difference right now to move folks out of poverty into more housing stability situations. Advocate and use the talking points.

Jim King – tremendous opportunity now. Surprised by AHFA's posture. As a Caucus – put something in front of Bob Strickland and his team – they may think they are waiting on direction, but we can go to Treasury and ask for the guidance we want them to give. Jim has been getting questions like how can we serve the Appalachian region better. Take what we want as local as they get and take it as high as they can get. Tim – will share AAHA letter this afternoon. (Tim serves on that board) there may not be housing provided if they don't make some changes – they have to be pro-active. Wait, conservative, play it close, need to shift.

4) Caucus Member Conversation – How do we build strength for Fahe agencies? <u>Tim</u> – Fahe is strong partner, advocate, a source of great information. Need to bring new Members to this caucus to strengthen the voice, mission, moving the needle in AL. Tired of being 50th. Set the example in the state and in the region – influence rural healthcare, housing, persistent poverty.

<u>Mary Ellen</u> – enjoys being around the other states Members – hear the innovation going on in other, more progressive places. A support group of sorts! Build the strength of Fahe agencies, add Members in AL, there are some great nonprofits in the state – not all putting together complex housing programs – need to help them get up to speed, partner, build their capacity.

<u>Lisa</u> – totally agree – coming from a smaller, volunteer, mission driven group

Path forward, trying to be bipartisan hard infrastructure roads, bridges serious investment in broadband (new). \$80B needed to build our rural and fill in gaps. Sticking point is subsidy to individuals. Alex appropriations also delayed, Faced with an enormous crisis finally building broadband, increase in housing/comm. dev. programs, plus-ing up emergency relief. We need to set the expectations even higher, long term what we need to think bigger Tim -
- b. <u>Hiring update</u> from Advocacy Department still in process in hiring the Adv. Director, steady stream of interviews, but haven't found someone exactly the right fit. Leadership Dev. Director – native of SW Virginia – Andreas, will meet him at the Annual Mtg.
- c. <u>Communications Director</u> Ted Boyatt Maryville, TN. Joined Fahe 2½ mo. ago, works remotely from TN Valley Blount Co. Not a great deal of concrete specifics right now, still rebuilding the communication team recruitment, hiring, restructure media practices. Top line messaging, re-branding. Help clarify identity, touchpoints, web presence, etc. Intermediate term great opportunities for our team to help complement, reinforce a combined message, raise awareness, celebrate your accomplishments/good work.

- a. <u>Member Updates</u> (Vonda) In our conversations with the membership committee, we are doing evaluations on Membership now as renewal season is here. Dear Fahe Member Organizations,

As some of you may know, my name is Nick Martire and I am working as Fahe's Research and Outreach Coordinator for the upcoming year, via AmeriCorps. My main focus for the year will be working with Members interested in implementing a program similar to the Housing Development Alliance (HDA)'s Hope Building project.

The Hope Building project was designed to address three issues:

- 1) The gap between the cost of building a home and price it sells at
- 2) The lack of good jobs available in the area
- 3) Provide individuals in recovery a path to gainful employment

Program Design

Hope Building combined a paid, on-the-job construction training program with a classroom component for individuals in addiction recovery. Three days a week, trainees worked on construction sites building middle-income homes. Another weekday was dedicated to classwork at Hazard Community and Technical College (HCTC). After a year of classes in the program, trainees could receive certificates in the following: Basic Carpentry, Residential Roofer, Carpenter Helper, or Construction Form Helper. These certificates comprise approximately 50% of the coursework needed to complete an Associate Degree in Construction Technology.

HDA partnered with the Perry County Drug Court, Hazard Community and Technical College, and other organizations to make this program possible. Hope Building was funded mainly through a three-year ARC POWER Grant.

Program Results

Trainees worked on 18 sites from August 2019-June 2021, four of which were homes they constructed exclusively. In under two years, the Hope Building houses went from a deficit of \$32,000 between appraisals and building cost, to a \$22,000 surplus. Although the last home sold may not be a reliable indicator due to the purchaser buying the property for more than the asking price, HDA Executive Director Scott McReynolds estimated that on balance, the appraisal gaps in Hazard have shrunk by 33%, from \$30,000 to \$20,000.

As of March 2021, 16 trainees have worked in the program, 8 of which have been "improved" as measured by completion of the program, finding full-time gainful employment, or completing their certificate through HCTC. This improvement rate is double that of individuals at Perry County Drug Court that do not participate in the program.

Potential Difficulties and Drawbacks


The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic has increased the price, and decreased the supply, of building materials for homes. COVID has also created difficulties for administering in-person classes, some of which are necessary components of program coursework.

A longer grant than three years may be necessary to completely shrink the appraisal gap, depending on where the Member operates. If the Hazard appraisal gap continued to decrease at the same rate observed during Hope Springs, it would close around six years after the program began.

Expanding the Program

I will work Members interested in creating a similar program for their service area that have the capacity to do so successfully. This includes identifying partner organizations and a target population to work as trainees, as well as other program aspects. I have also identified potential funding streams that could be utilized in creating a similar project.
